Grand Council Plans Wartime Activities

THE POSTPONEMENT of the 14th Grand Chapter Congress of Delta Sigma Pi which had been scheduled for Minneapolis in September and which was postponed in order to co-operate with the Office of Defense Transportation in the prosecution of the War effort, brought many unusual problems for consideration at an epochal meeting of the Grand Council held in Chicago, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, August 14, 15 and 16, 1942. So many timely and unusual problems were discussed and at such length that the Grand Council was in session continuously for three days and nights, except for time out for meals and to sleep, and, in fact, all Grand Council members but one were able to remain over in Chicago on Monday to discuss informally other problems which may face Delta Sigma Pi during the coming year.

First of all, the Grand Council found that most of our chapters were in very good condition at the close of last college year. Whereas we had anticipated a large decrease in initiations, this decrease had turned out to be very small, much less than anticipated. Furthermore, two chapters were installed during the year at Kent State University in Ohio and at Rutgers University in New Jersey and the addition of these initiates brought the total membership figure to even higher than the record of the previous year. Several of the national committees had very satisfactory reports to render and, taking everything into consideration, the fraternity enjoyed a rather successful year. One of the interesting features of last year had been the addition to the Central Office staff of a special assistant to the Grand Secretary-Treasurer. Rowland D. Sager, Head Master of our Missouri chapter the previous year, had been appointed to this post and he had travelled extensively throughout the fraternity for over four months. This had proven so satisfactory that the Grand Council endeavored to engage his services for another period this fall but, unfortunately, he was not available.

Final standings of the 1942 Chapter Efficiency Contest revealed that nine chapters had turned in a perfect score of 100,000 points and had tied for first place. These nine chapters were: Beta at Northwestern, Delta at Marquette, Kappa at Georgia Evening College, Alpha Beta at Missouri, Alpha Delta at Nebraska, Alpha Epsilon at Minnesota, Alpha Upsilon at Miami, Beta Iota at Baylor and Beta Kappa at Texas. Heartiest congratulations! Twelve other chapters made the Honor Roll with a final standing of 85,000 points or more and these included the following chapters: Beta Nu at Pennsylvania, Beta Epsilon at Oklahoma, Zeta at Northwestern (Evanston), Alpha Lambda at North Carolina, Beta Omicron at Newark, Psi at Wisconsin, Beta Theta at Creighton, Omega at Temple, Alpha Zeta at Tennessee, Alpha Theta at Cincinnati, Chi at Johns Hopkins and Beta Gamma at South Carolina. Paid up national

alumni membership cards for their first year out of college will be sent to the active members of all of these 21 chapters, while the Head Masters of the nine chapters having a perfect score will all receive Life Memberships in Delta Sigma Pi.

Grand Secretary-Treasurer Wright reported that a total of 40 undergraduate loans had been made, totaling \$7,000 and of these 21 loans were outstanding with balances due totaling \$3,290 and the other 19 loans had been paid in full. Our record has been splendid in this connection, and the Grand Council was well pleased with our record in this respect.

The Grand Council gave considerable thought to the budget for the coming year and in anticipation of reduced income made certain downward revisions for the coming year.

A very satisfactory number of members have taken out Life Memberships during the year, but it was pointed out that several thousand of our alumni could easily afford Life Memberships and that we should be unrelenting in our efforts to endeavor to interest more of them in this worthy program each year.

Many plans for the coming year were discussed by the Grand Council and various actions taken. As to just what date college men would be inducted into the Army was not known at the time this meeting was held, but it was felt that the first semester, at least, would find our chapters for the most part operating under fairly normal conditions.

Of unusual and timely significance was the rather thorough discussion as to what the fraternity could do to provide special services to the many brothers who would eventually be in the armed forces of our country. This was analysed from every possible angle and thoroughly discussed for the better part of one day. It was the unanimous decision of the Grand Council to establish a national War Service Committee and since Delta Sigma Pi would be having alumni from every chapter and alumni club in service and they will be stationed in all sections of the country as well as overseas it was felt that these services should be planned, organized and operated on a nationwide basis rather than leaving it up to each individual chapter and alumni club. It was also voted to select the personnel of this national War Service Committee from among the alumni of our many chapters now residing in the Chicago area. This was done because the records and facilities of the Central Office would be easily available to this committee. This decision has since proven exceedingly wise as it has made possible a frequency of meeting of this committee which otherwise could not have been held and which has proven so essential to the development of this project. In fact, more than a dozen meetings of this War Service Committee have been held, three of them in one week. These meetings have provided an excellent opportunity for the exchange of many ideas and has enabled the

War Service committee to act promptly, to their advantage.

A Service Directory has been established at the Central Office with two cards for every member in service. One is arranged by chapters and the other classified by service location. Membership lists by camps, posts and training schools can be easily prepared and mailed to these individual groups and this has been frequently done.

A special engraved recognition card has been prepared and is being mailed to all members in service as soon as they report their service address to the Central Office. A War Service News will be published, correspondence will be carried on with every member in service, contact secretaries will be established in many cities, everything possible will be done from a fraternity point of view to aid in keeping the morale of our members in service at the highest possible level at all times.

All of this activity can only be made possible through the voluntary contributions of our alumni membership. All alumni are fraternally invited to contribute to this War Service Program Fund in order that we may provide the greatest possible services to our brothers in uniform. All contributions should be sent to the War Service Committee in care of the Central Office of the fraternity. We will tell you more about the progress of this work in future issues of THE DELTASIC.

Another unusual and significant action also took place at this Grand Council meeting. The Grand Chapter Congress had been postponed by action of the Grand Council and while this action was later approved by the chapters one of the members of the Grand Council pointed out that had a Grand Chapter Congress been held the terms of certain members of the Grand Council would have expired this fall. It was his suggestion that the members of the Grand Council should proceed as though a Grand Chapter Congress had been held insofar as their terms of office were concerned and that all terms that would have expired this fall had a Grand Chapter Congress been held be

considered as having expired. This met with unanimous favor among the members of the Grand Council and it was unanimously voted to put this in effect as of September 1. Members of the Grand Council, except the Grand President, are elected for terms of office to expire at the second Grand Chapter Congress following election, thus the terms of the Grand President and three members of the Grand Council were considered as expiring on September 1. After considerable discussion and a reluctance on his part to succeed himself as Grand President under normal conditions, the Grand Council members decided that in view of the existing emergency and his experience as Grand President it would be best to continue Brother McKewen in office for a second term and this was so voted.

Brothers Frank C. Brandes, Georgia-Kappa, now located in Kansas City, Missouri, Rudolph Janzen, Minnesota, of Minneapolis, Minnesota, and Howard B. Johnson, Georgia-Kappa, of Atlanta, Georgia, were elected to membership on the Grand Council. Past Grand President R. C. Schmidt, Theta, of Detroit, Michigan, Past Grand President E. L. Schujahn, Wisconsin, of Buffalo, New York, and Herbert W. Wehe, Pittsburgh, of Greensburgh, Pennsylvania, all retired from the Grand Council. These members have all had long and distinguished records of service in the fraternity, Brother Schmidt having served continuously on the Grand Council since 1922, Brother Schujahn since 1926 and Brother Wehe since 1928.

The following members continue on the Grand Council, their terms of office expiring at the next meeting of the Grand Chapter Congress: Past Grand President Eugene D. Milener, Johns Hopkins, of New York, New York, Kenneth B. White, Boston, of Dallas, Texas, and Fred W. Floyd, Pennsylvania, of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. H. G. Wright, Northwestern, of Chicago, was reappointed Grand Secretary-Treasurer of Delta Sigma Pi by the Grand Council.

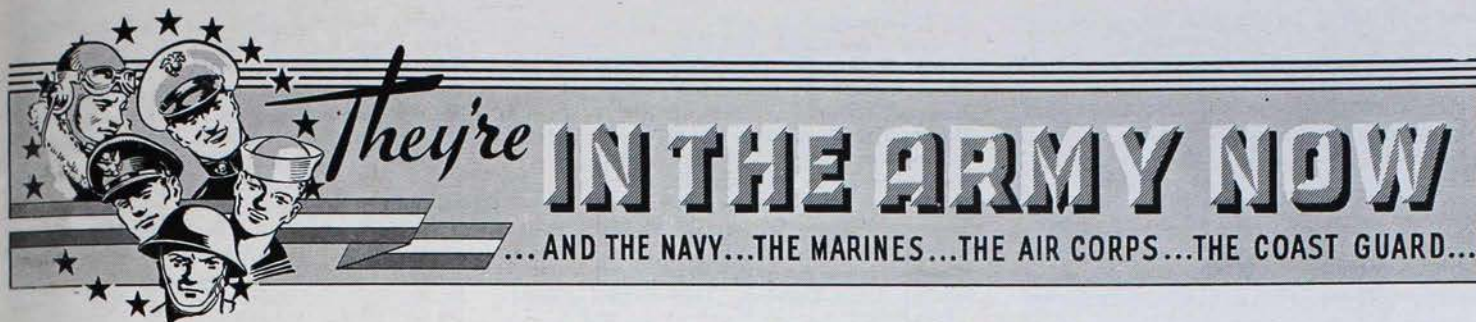

1,018 Members Now in the Armed Forces

LAST JANUARY we published the names of 334 members of Delta Sigma Pi then in the armed forces of our country. This list had increased to 528 members in the March issue of THE DELTASIG and to around 900 in the May issue. In this issue we published the names of 1,018 members of Delta Sigma Pi now serving in some branch of the armed forces of our country, truly a remarkable number. And at that, this list is far from complete for it represents only the names of those members for whom data has been reported to the Central Office. Many other members are undoubtedly in the armed forces, but this information has not yet reached us. It is hoped that every member will scan this list carefully and will report promptly to the Central Office the name of any additional member he knows to be in service, and, if possible, his military address. This will permit us to add these names to our Honor Roll.

On receipt of this information we will mail a letter to the member and as soon as he returns his Service Directory form we will send him the special engraved identification card we have prepared for all of our members serving in the armed forces. Because of certain censorship regulations it is not possible for us to publish service addresses for members now stationed outside of the United States, but we shall be glad to send the service address of any member to you on receipt of your request and a stamped reply envelope.
