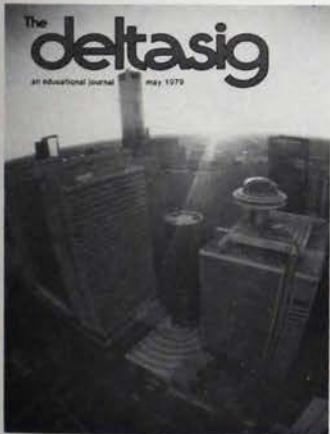

Convention Time Is Here

.....last call for atlanta

When the gavel sounds at 9:00 on the morning of August 13, 1979, the fraternity family will have gathered in Atlanta for the 32nd Grand Chapter Congress. The dates for the convention are August 12-16, 1979, and the location is the Marriott Hotel in "downtown" Atlanta, Georgia. Appearing in this issue of the magazine are a summary of the convention program and schedule, an advance registration form, and information on costs.

Arriving on Sunday, August 12, conventioners will see the big, comfortable, leisure-style Marriott. It is a casual hotel, more of a resort facility than the smart, slick, big-city type of place. Attendees in their free time can relax by the huge swimming pool with its lounge chairs and poolside services and be assured that the roof will be closed if the weather should be bad.

Within the hotel are several places for food or entertainment. The Sirloin and Saddle offers steak and a wide choice of their foods. The Fairfield Inn is a 24 hour coffee shop offering full meals

or light snacks. The Windjammer provides a colorful background filled with dining, exotic drinks, dancing and entertainment. The Cove also offers after-dinner dancing and at lunch has a great seafood menu. The hotel is convenient to other facilities and attractions in the city center. If a guest doesn't want to leave the hotel, he doesn't need to. Within the hotel are the restaurants and lounges, beauty and barber services, the swimming pool and health club facilities, a gift shop and a package store, and airline reservation desks all in addition to the 800 comfortable, spacious guest rooms.

OPENING DAY

The 32nd Grand Chapter Congress officially opens on August 12, with registration beginning at 1:00 P.M., and continuing until 5:00 P.M. Those attending the convention will want to arrive during this time period in order to register before events later in the day and to check into their hotel rooms anytime after 3:00 P.M.

The Grand President's Reception will run from 6:30 P.M. to 7:30 P.M., giving everyone a chance to meet all the members of the Board of Directors and get acquainted with others

attending the convention. Allowing everyone time for dinner at a location of their choice, the opening social function of the convention begins at 9:00 P.M. In the ballroom the Deltasig Disco featuring live music opens with fun and entertainment.

SECOND DAY

The Opening Business Session will begin promptly at 9:00 A.M. on Monday, August 13, and will include biennial reports from the national officers and the national committees. Official voting delegates will be seated and additional nominations for national officer positions to be elected will be made from the floor.

While fraternity members are in the opening business session, spouses and children will have an opportunity to see Atlanta by bus tour, stopping for a walking tour and lunch, continuing on for a shopping excursion, and returning to the hotel about mid-afternoon.

After fraternity members have a break for lunch they will hear the Keynote Address beginning at 2:00 P.M. The speaker and his message will be listed in the official convention program distributed at registration.

From this address, undergraduates, alumni and national officers will move to the educational seminars. The first of the undergraduate workshops and the ones which follow will help to improve chapter operations and generate greater success. Alumni will be meeting in their own session with the Director of Alumni Activities. At 7:00 P.M. the second of the undergraduate seminars will take place with regional meetings for all 12 regions beginning at 8:30 P.M.

THIRD DAY

On Tuesday, August 14, the third and fourth undergraduate seminars begin at 9:00 and 10:30 A.M., respectively. A second alumni session will begin at 10:30. The balance of the day is free for recreation and personal activities.

There is a luncheon and the biennial meeting of the Delta Sigma Pi Educational Foundation at 12:30 P.M. on Tuesday, August 14. The officers of the Foundation have indicated that the meeting is open to anyone interested in attending whether they are members of the Foundation or not.

FOURTH DAY

Beginning at 9:00 A.M., on

Wednesday, August 15, will be the second business session of the convention. At this session the voting delegates will consider the amendments proposed to the National Constitution and Bylaws which were properly submitted by the March 1, 1979 deadline date and will consider any resolutions presented. This session will also be the last opportunity

to make nominations for the national offices to be elected at this Grand Chapter Congress.

A Meet the Candidates Forum beginning at 2:00 P.M. will give delegates and others (members only) the chance to hear and question those in nomination for the offices of Grand President and Director of Alumni Activities.

Beginning promptly at 4:00 P.M. is one of the highlights of the convention, the beautiful and moving initiation of the Honorary Member at Large.

Seven in the evening marks the hour of what is surely the highlight of the convention, the Grand Chapter Congress Banquet. The dinner address will be given by the Honorary Member at Large initiated into membership in Delta Sigma Pi earlier in the day.

FINAL DAY

The final business session begins on Thursday, August 16, at 8:30 A.M. On the agenda will be the election of the national officers for 1979-81, including the Grand President, Director of Alumni Activities, and Regional Directors.

The convention concludes with the Farewell Luncheon where retiring national officers are honored, chapter and alumni club awards are presented, and Deltasigs say goodbye until they meet again.

YOU NEED TO KNOW

What to Wear. Men will need coat and tie for the Opening Business Session, the initiation of the Honorary Member at Large, and the Grand Chapter Congress Banquet. Women will need pantsuits or appropriate daytime dresses for business sessions, workshops, and the initiation. At the Grand Chapter Congress Banquet, Board members and many others wear dinner jackets while women wear appropriate long or street-length dresses. Sportswear is acceptable for other activities such as the additional business sessions, the educational seminars, and evening activities. Better restaurants require coat and tie for men and equally appropriate wear for women. "Grubbies" are not welcome at fraternity functions or at many places in urban Atlanta.

For your leisure hours and free time during the convention, remember to bring swimwear, sports gear, cameras, or whatever you think you will need.

Some reminders. Hotel rates are European Plan, and do not include

meals. Except for the scheduled meals shown on the convention program, attendees may eat wherever they choose. As noted in the March magazine, Atlanta offers a number of restaurants in a wide range of tastes and prices.

Why convention? The important thing about the Grand Chapter Congress is People; Deltasigs who gather to learn in the workshops, to determine the future of the fraternity through legislation and elections, and to build fraternalism nationally. Anyone attending a Grand

Chapter Congress leaves with a greater appreciation of our Ritual, and a living definition of Brotherhood. Those who don't attend are the losers. The grand Chapter Congress is —Deltasigs from across the country.

Transportation. Atlanta is easily accessible by car using one of the interstates passing the edge of downtown; the airport is served by major carriers and direct flights or connections into Atlanta are excellent. Other transportation such as bus also serves the city.

REGISTRATION.

1. Advance Registration Fee (total convention package appears on the advance registration form).

2. On-site Registration (at the convention hotel on August 12) will be an additional \$5.00 above the advance registration fee.

3. Cancellations prior to 30 days (July 12) before the opening day of the Grand Chapter Congress (August 12) will incur a \$5.00 handling fee. No refunds on cancellations will be made after July 12, 1979.

ALUMNI REPORT

THIS WILL BE MY last article in The DELTASIG as Director of Alumni Activities, and it seemed entirely fitting at this juncture to review the accomplishments of the Committee on Alumni Activities during the past four years. Throughout this period the individual members of the Committee have been of tremendous help and I want to express my appreciation here.

During the last four years the number of functioning alumni clubs has grown from 22 to 40. Life Memberships have increased from approximately 8,200 to over 11,000, an increase of about 34 per cent. This resulted in an increase of around \$173,000 to the National Endowment Fund—a 44 per cent increase! The Committee on Alumni Activities has played a direct part in the growth of the Life Membership program, starting over 250 Brothers on their Life Membership at the past year's regional conferences alone. Also during the past four years, non-Life Member alumni dues have increased by almost 64 per cent!

Last Summer, for the first time in ten years, the Manual for Alumni Club Operations was revised, reprinted, and distributed at the regional conferences. Also revised and distributed was the "Idea Book," containing examples of flyers, newsletters, and other publications used by our various alumni clubs. Both publications were compiled and edited by the Committee on Alumni Activities. Alumni Seminars were held at each of the 12 regional conferences held last Fall and this Spring, with representatives from almost every alumni club in attendance.

The tremendous surge of alumni enthusiasm and participation is difficult to reduce to numbers. Suffice

it to say, however, that alumni clubs and individual alumni are involving themselves in undergraduate activities, regional conferences, Grand Chapter Congresses, and day-to-day operations of the fraternity at a rate unsurpassed in my memory. With dedication like this, we need not worry about the future of our fraternity.

Brothers, the past four years have not been easy, but they have certainly been a fulfilling experience. And I think the record shows that they have been successful years. After all, how can one go wrong with the undying cooperation of the best people anywhere—Brothers of Delta Sigma Pi! Thank you for the opportunity.

ORGANIZING AN ALUMNI CLUB

1. Request from The Central Office a copy of the Manual for Alumni Club Operations and a geographic printout of all Deltasigs residing in your area. List *all* ZIP Codes from lowest to highest numbers for the area where you wish to seek membership.
2. Send out a letter of intent stating that you are planning to organize an alumni club. Include an application blank for those interested in becoming a member. Remember to ask for both address and phone number. Be sure to include the question "Are you interested in assisting in the organizational stage of our Alumni Club?" (Through this initial contact you will be able to come up with an organizational committee). Keep this committee small, around five members, so immediate decisions can be made.
3. You now have your organizational committee selected. This committee must meet to begin planning the organizational meeting. Utilize all of the members of the committee, keeping in touch with each member by telephone. A notice of the organizational meeting should be sent to all who have answered your original application.
4. The Organizational Meeting should be an informal coffee or smoker to help develop and guide your future programs by soliciting the desires of those in attendance. Pass out a questionnaire asking "What type of program would you like to have?" (More of our most successful clubs have moved away from a speaker or formal program to a more social program involving the entire family several times during the year). Ask about hobbies, sports and general interests. You will be surprised how well you can plan a program utilizing this information.
5. Work on the Constitution and Bylaws for your Alumni Club as described in the "Manual." You need a minimum membership of 10 members to franchise your alumni club nationally. The franchise fee of \$20.00 is to be submitted with your letter of application and a copy of your Constitution and Bylaws, with a list of your charter members and \$10.00 in National Alumni Dues for your non-Life Members. Submit your application with the above enclosures to The Central Office. Upon approval you will receive your charter.
6. You should elect officers of the new alumni club, filling out the Form L (List of Officers of the Alumni Club) and submit it to The Central Office. This form should be typewritten and completed in its entirety.
7. Your Alumni Club is now organized and franchised and should be well on its way to success.
8. The Executive Committee (officers of the Alumni Club) should meet privately—planning, arranging, and directing the alumni club program. You will notice, after being involved in the alumni program for a while, that the membership would rather elect officers to plan and direct the function and not be involved in the planning or arrangements. The Alumni Club meetings should be entertaining, of common interest, and always inviting to the entire membership.
9. You should elect a representative to coordinate activities with your local undergraduate chapter(s) if any are in your area. Be sure the Alumni Club representative is a Brother that is outgoing and will get involved with the undergraduates. He should attend some of their meetings and functions whenever possible. Your club should have several joint functions with the undergraduates each year so you can interest them in joining the alumni club upon graduation. The Sacramento Alumni Club gives the first year membership in the Alumni Club to the graduating seniors of the local chapter, which has enhanced its membership greatly. You should have a membership card printed to present to those Brothers paying local Alumni Club dues.
10. Be sure to prepare articles and good quality photographs of your Alumni Club activities and submit them for publication in the Alumni Section of The DELTASIG Magazine. Be sure to close each article with "any Brother in our area wishing to join our Alumni Club, please write or call Brother _____", listing his address and telephone number. You will be surprised how many calls you will receive from Life Members, Alumni and undergraduates either passing through, visiting or residing in your respective areas.
11. You now have an excellent group of involved Deltasigs, those choosing to become involved. Our fraternity, unlike most of the professional fraternities, is not professionals doing a common thing, but professionals in diversified occupations of common interest. We have the greatest potential of any professional fraternity and that is the involvement of a complete cross-section of businessmen from Commerce and Business. You now have your club organized and the balance is left to you and your membership. Delta Sigma Pi is you!

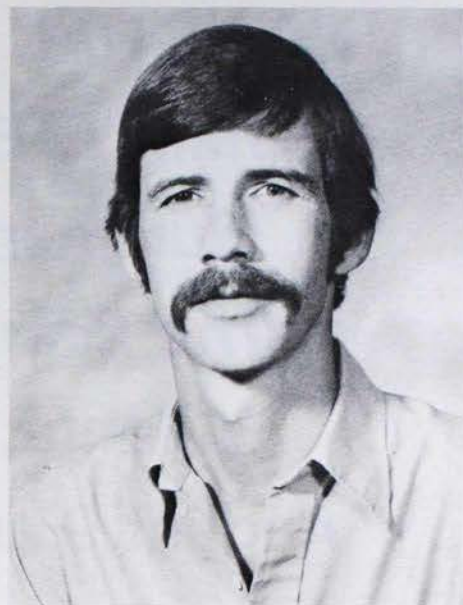

It was once again a privilege for me to attend the National Executive Committee meeting of the Fraternity held in Denver, Colorado, the weekend of February 23-25, 1979, as a representative of the undergraduates and participate in the making of some important Fraternity decisions. The Executive Committee is the principal governing body of the Fraternity and the senior Undergraduate of the Year is invited to participate in these meetings on behalf of undergraduates. Many important things happened that each of our members should be aware of.

Much discussion centered upon the Grand Chapter Congress to be held in Atlanta in August, as is evident throughout this issue of the magazine. This Congress plans to be the *BEST* ever and provides an unparalleled opportunity for members to conduct fraternity business and elect officers, engage in educational seminars and discussions for better chapter operations, and participate in the fellowship of the Brotherhood. The Executive Committee has recommended a constitutional amendment to provide for indemnification of officers and directors of the Fraternity, a standard feature of all corporations and most other organizations that chapters are urged to consider and approve. The Committee further looked into long-range planning for the Fraternity, the monitoring of committees of the Fraternity and made necessary ritual changes to make our ritual applicable to both men and women alike; also approved was a new award for Community Service and involvement to encourage chapters to extend their professionalism to their schools and communities.

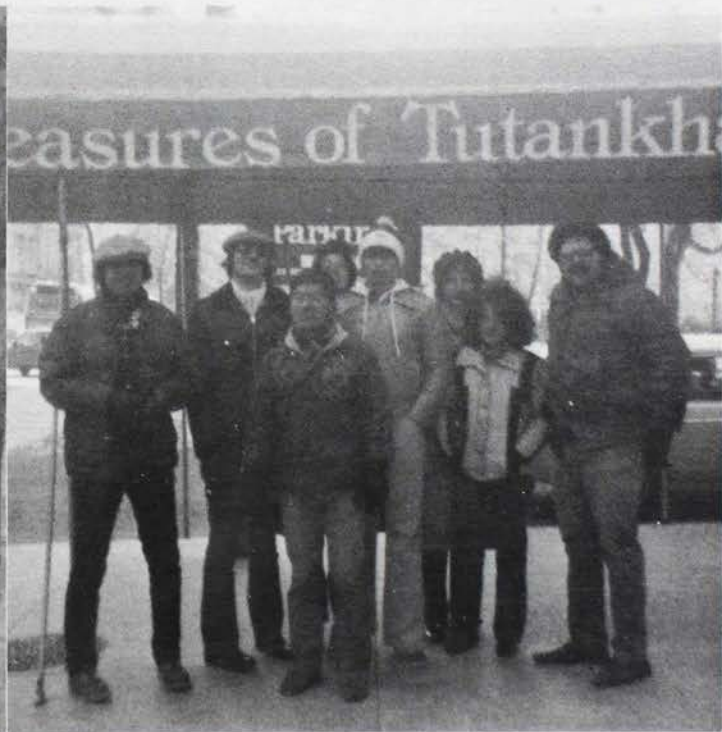

INDIANA-NORTHWEST

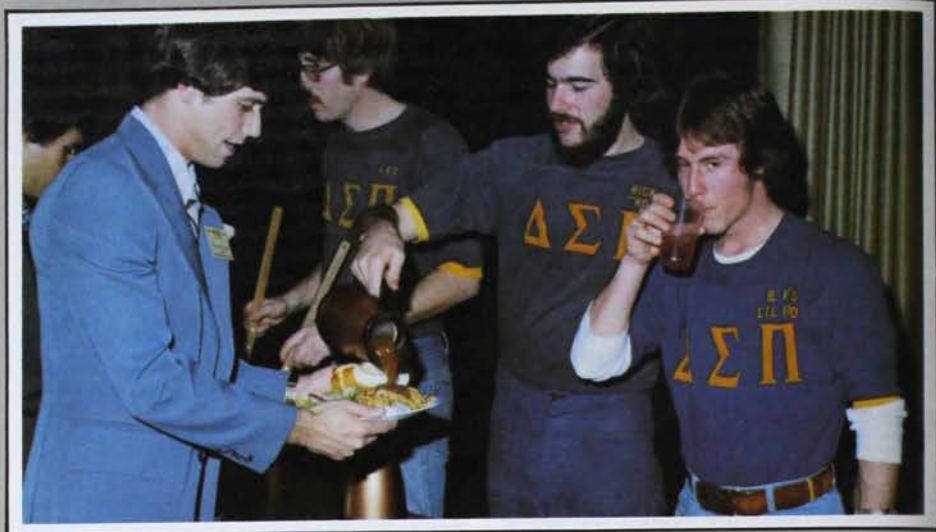
