Last August our fraternity achieved one of its 11 Goals For The Biennium: The National Executive Committee, at its regular semi-annual meeting in Indianapolis, adopted Junior Achievement as our National Community Service project. Mr. Karl Flemke, National President of Junior Achievement, was present at the meeting to accept our offer of assistance on behalf of JA's Board of Directors and staff.

The selection of Junior Achievement as Delta Sigma Pi's "official" community service project is the culmination of several years of study by the Committee on Professionalism and the National Executive Committee. We wanted to support an organization with which Deltasigs could become involved on the local and national levels, but which would also reflect our traditional values in the areas of commerce and education. We believe we have found all that and more in JA!

Junior Achievement was

founded in 1919 in Springfield, Massachusetts, and has grown to more than 250 "operating areas" in all 50 states and 16 foreign countries. Through its national office in Stamford, Connecticut, and regional offices in Baltimore, St. Louis and Denver, JA provides practical, hands-on experience in the private enterprise economic system. Over 8,000 JA high school companies are formed each year, and this is just one of five areas of involvement Junior Achievement is currently offering to junior high, high school and college students. Other areas include Project Business, a flexible economic education program for eighth and ninth graders, and Applied Management, a program of practical and theoretical business and economic education activities for college students; many business majors nationwide are receiving college credit for participation as advisors in the JA high school program through Applied Management.

Opportunities for involvement by Deltasigs in JA-sponsored programs are almost limitless. Individual members may want to become involved as "advisors" to local JA companies and/or participate in the Applied Management curriculum. Entire chapters may be interested in participating in an advisory capacity with local JA companies or furnishing speakers to a Project Business class. In fact, several of our chapters have already become involved with Junior Achievement in recent years, and many, many of our members are former "Junior Achievers." The extent of your chapter's involvement with JA is limited only by its desire and the amount of time its members

are willing to spend. Additional information on opportunities with JA will be forthcoming to each chapter.

As Deltasigs, we have always considered community service to be part and parcel of professionalism; "to further the civic and commercial welfare of the community" has long been our creed. Therefore, it is right and proper that each chapter and its members contribute in their own way to the betterment of the community around them. Almost all of our 159 active undergraduate chapters hold one or more community service activities each year, including blood drives, March of Dimes walk-a-thons, visits to nursing homes, canned food drives and countless other activities. By adopting Junior Achievement as our National Community Service project, it is certainly not our intention to supplant or inhibit the various charitable endeavors with which Deltasigs have associated themselves over the years. Rather, it is with pride and deep satisfaction that we offer JA to you as an extension of your existing community service activities—and as an opportunity to be of even greater service to the world around you.

We believe Junior Achievement is an organization which shares many of the same ideals as Delta Sigma Pi. Hopefully, we can pursue many of these ideals together—Delta Sigma Pi and Junior Achievement—for many years to come.

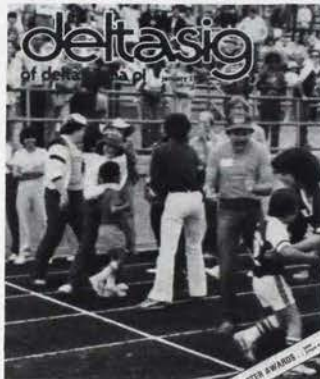

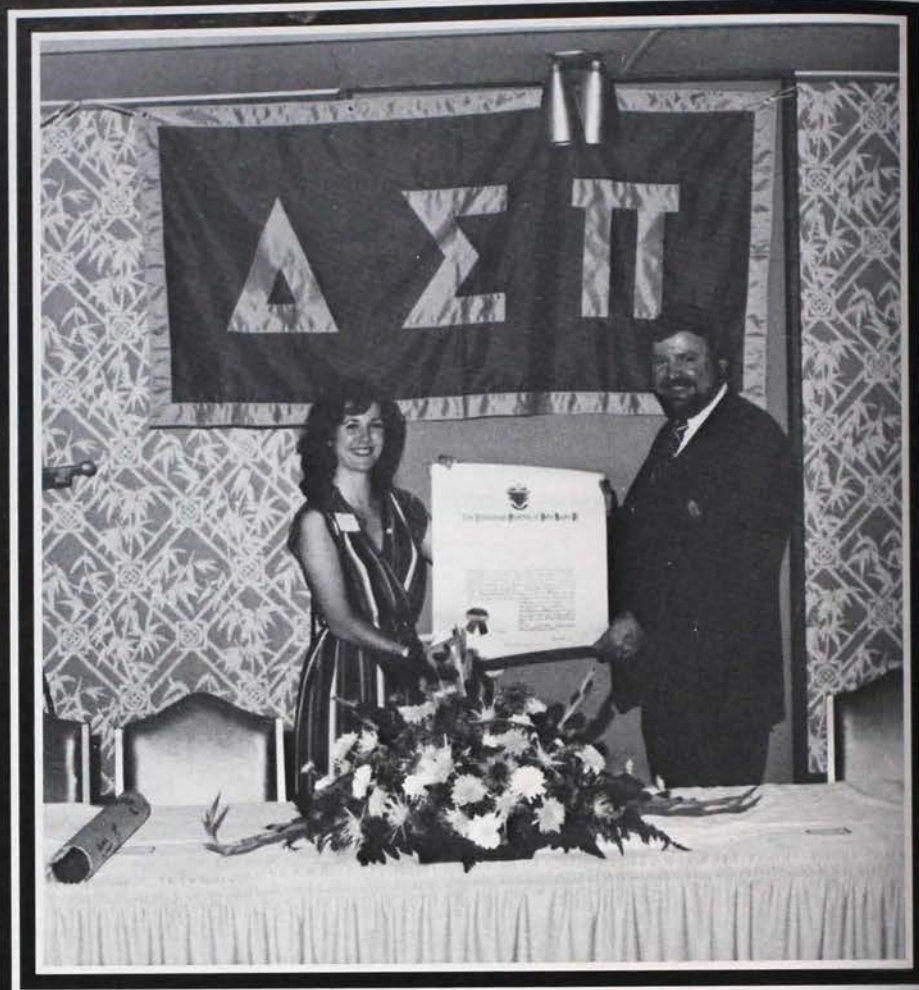

EXPANSION / REACTIVATION

The successful propagation of the ideals and principles of our fraternity to additional college and university campuses continued during the 1981-82 academic year. Delta Sigma Pi installed a total of five new undergraduate chapters and reactivated two previously dormant chapters. The birth of our three newest chapters and the rebirth of a pair of inactive chapters occurred during the spring of 1982. We welcome these chapters and all of their members into our Brotherhood.

DELTA THETA RETURNS TO O.C.U.

After an absence of 10 years, Delta Theta Chapter was reactivated at Oklahoma City University on March 6, 1982. With the initiation

of 19 new Brothers, Delta Sigma Pi once again has four active undergraduate chapters in the State of Oklahoma.

District Director Michael L. Marcotte approached the administration at OCU with the intent of reactivating Delta Theta Chapter during the fall of 1981. The idea was supported by both the administration and faculty, and recruiting of prospective members began in early January. District Director Marcotte and Grand President Michael R. Mallonee, a resident of Oklahoma City, provided valuable support and guidance to the interested business students. By late February, the group's petition to reactivate the chapter charter was accepted by the Board of Directors of the fraternity.

Present at the reactivation on March 6 were Grand President Mallonee, Midwestern Regional Director James F. Deaton, District Director Marcotte, Chapter Consultant Jere W. White, Chapter Advisor Dr. R. Wayne Ferguson, an alumnus of Beta Kappa Chapter at the University of Texas-Austin and now a faculty member at Oklahoma City University, members of the administration and business faculty at OCU, members of Beta Epsilon (Oklahoma), Beta Chi (Tulsa), Gamma Epsilon (Oklahoma State) and Kappa Omicron (Southwest Missouri State) Chapters and, of course, the 19 newest members of Delta Theta Chapter. We welcome the initiation of these Brothers into the fraternity and the return of Delta

Sigma Pi to Oklahoma City University.

NEW CHAPTER AT ADELPHI

Kappa Rho Chapter came into existence at Adelphi University in Garden City, Long Island, New York, as 33 new Brothers were initiated on March 27, 1982. Delta Sigma Pi now has five undergraduate chapters in the Greater New York City area and a total of eight active chapters in the State of New York.

The desire to establish a new chapter at Adelphi University originated with Marc A. Zutty, an undergraduate business major who has transferred to Adelphi from Rider College where he had been initiated into Beta Xi Chapter. In the spring of 1981, Marc and then Eastern Regional Director Richard J. Parnitzke met with the administration of the Schools of Business. Assistant Dean Robert W. Buckner, a Deltasig from Zeta Omicron Chapter at C. W. Post, welcomed the proposal. With faculty support secured, recruiting began. By July, the group of interested business students known as Beta Alpha Upsilon declared their intent to pursue a chapter charter. Four members attended the 33rd Grand Chapter Congress on Mackinac Island, Michigan, as guests in August, 1981.

Chartering efforts in earnest began in September at the beginning of the fall semester. Beta Alpha Upsilon received visits from Director of Chapter Operations Mark A. Roberts and Eastern Regional Director Dick Parnitzke while District Director Steven D. Kuptsis provided invaluable assistance on a day-to-day basis. By early January, 1982, the group had met nearly all chartering requirements and a petition was submitted to the Board of Directors shortly thereafter. After unanimous approval, March 27 was selected as the date of installation.

More than 100 Deltasigs gathered on Long Island that morning to assist with the ceremonies. Grand President Michael R. Mallonee, Executive Director Michael J. Mazur, Jr., then Eastern Regional Director (now Director of Alumni Activities) Richard J. Parnitzke, then District Director (now Eastern Regional Director) Steven D. Kuptsis, Faculty

Advisor R. Buckner and members of Alpha (New York University), Beta Rho (Rutgers), Zeta Eta (St. Peter's) and Zeta Omicron (C. W. Post) Chapters composed the installation team. Our undergraduate chapters in upstate New York and Connecticut and the New York-Metropolitan Alumni Chapter were also well represented. By the end of the day, 33 new Brothers were ready to perpetuate the goals and ideals of Delta Sigma Pi at Adelphi University.

ONE WEEKEND, TWO NEW CHAPTERS: IN INDIANA . . .

On Saturday, April 17, 1982, Kappa Sigma Chapter was established at Indiana University-Indianapolis becoming, for one day, Delta Sigma Pi's newest chapter. Twenty-eight charter members were initiated as the State of Indiana gained its seventh undergraduate chapter of Delta Sigma Pi.

At the beginning of the fall semester of 1981, Past East Central Regional Director Jeffrey L. Philippi and District Director Richard E. Trent made contact with the administration of IU-Indianapolis and obtained approval for beginning recruiting efforts. By the end of November, only weeks after the first organizational meeting, a

group of students formed a local fraternity, Alpha Psi Omega, and notified The Central Office of its intent to petition for a chapter charter from Delta Sigma Pi. The members continued to systematically fulfill all requirements. Additional recruiting functions were conducted during February to attract other qualified, interested business students. By late March, all requirements had been met and the petition had been approved.

On April 17, a large group of Deltasigs congregated on the campus in downtown Indianapolis. Among them were the members of the installation team: Grand President Michael R. Mallonee, Executive Director Michael J. Mazur, Jr., Assistant Executive Director Michael T. Walsh, Chapter Consultant Jere W. White, Central Regional Director John V. Henik, District Directors Richard E. Trent and Richard M. Garber, Faculty Advisor William P. Jones, Jr., and members of Alpha Pi (Indiana-Bloomington), Delta Tau (Indiana State) and Epsilon Xi (Ball State) Chapters and the Indianapolis Alumni Chapter. Many other Deltasigs from other undergraduate and alumni chapters in the region were also present to welcome Kappa Sigma Chapter and its 28 charter members into our fraternal family.

. . . AND IN SOUTH CAROLINA

The following day—Sunday, April 18, 1982,—was the "birthday" of Kappa Tau Chapter, founded at Clemson University in Clemson, South Carolina. While Kappa Tau was only the second chapter established by the fraternity in that state, it became Delta Sigma Pi's 204th undergraduate chapter.

Initial contact with interested business students at Clemson was made by Beta Gamma Chapter (University of South Carolina) members Charles S. Wullner, Jr., and Charles J. Eaton, Jr., in early January, 1982. Despite the sometimes fierce intra-state rivalry that exists between these two universities, the Clemson students enthusiastically welcomed the proposal of the Brothers from South Carolina. Within a month, a large group of business students had organized Chi Delta Sigma and declared its intent to affiliate with Delta Sigma Pi. Both

the administration and the business faculty avidly supported the group's efforts; in the process, we learned of the presence of five faculty Deltasigs. The members of Chi Delta Sigma rapidly fulfilled all of the requirements for a chapter charter and petitioned the Board of Directors of Delta Sigma Pi. After the members of the Board learned of the enthusiasm of the group's members and the exceptional progress they had made they voted unanimously to approve the petition and set April 18 as the installation date.

That Sunday proved to be a clear, sunny spring day in the hills of Western South Carolina. Registration took place on the patio of the College of Commerce and Industry building as the members of the installation team gathered: Past Grand President William W. Tatum, Jr., Director of Chapter Operations Mark A. Roberts, Southeastern Regional Director C. Dean Ferguson, Faculty Advisor Paul F. Petersen, Chapter Advisor Charles F. Eaton, Jr., and members of Kappa (Georgia State), Pi (Georgia) and Beta Gamma (South Carolina) Chapters and the Columbia, South

Carolina Alumni Chapter. These Deltasigs and many others from the region warmly welcomed into the Brotherhood the 31 enthusiastic charter members of our fraternity's 204th and newest—for the moment—undergraduate chapter.

DELTASIG RETURNS TO MERCER

After an absence of nearly 50 years, Delta Sigma Pi is back at Mercer University in Macon, Georgia. On May 23, 1982, Alpha Tau Chapter was reactivated as 20 new Brothers were initiated. With the reinstatement of the chapter charter, the fraternity now has six active undergraduate chapters within the State of Georgia.

The School of Commerce at Mercer was a casualty of the Great Depression. In early 1933, the university ceased to offer a bachelor's degree in business. Nearly a half-century later, in September, 1981, Dr. Charles H. Andrews, Dean of the reformed School of Business and Economics at Mercer, met with Assistant Executive Director Michael T. Walsh and Southeastern Regional Director C. Dean Ferguson.

son. During that meeting, plans were made to reactivate the chapter. Dean Andrews actively sought support from both faculty and students. A group of interested students had formed by the end of the fall quarter. After the beginning of 1982, the group began the requirements for reactivation. Additional recruiting activities were conducted during the spring and, by mid-May, their petition to reactivate the chapter charter was approved by the Board of Directors.

On Sunday, May 23, 1982, Deltasigs congregated on the Mercer University campus in Macon. Members from four of the undergraduate chapters in Georgia—Kappa (Georgia State), Pi (Georgia), Theta Mu (Columbus) and Iota Mu (Georgia College) Chapters—were present to assist on the installation team. Grand President Michael R. Malloree, Southeastern Regional Director C. Dean Ferguson and Director of Chapter Operations Mark A. Roberts also participated in the ceremonies. Together, they marked the rebirth of Alpha Tau Chapter and the return of our professional business fraternity to Mercer University.

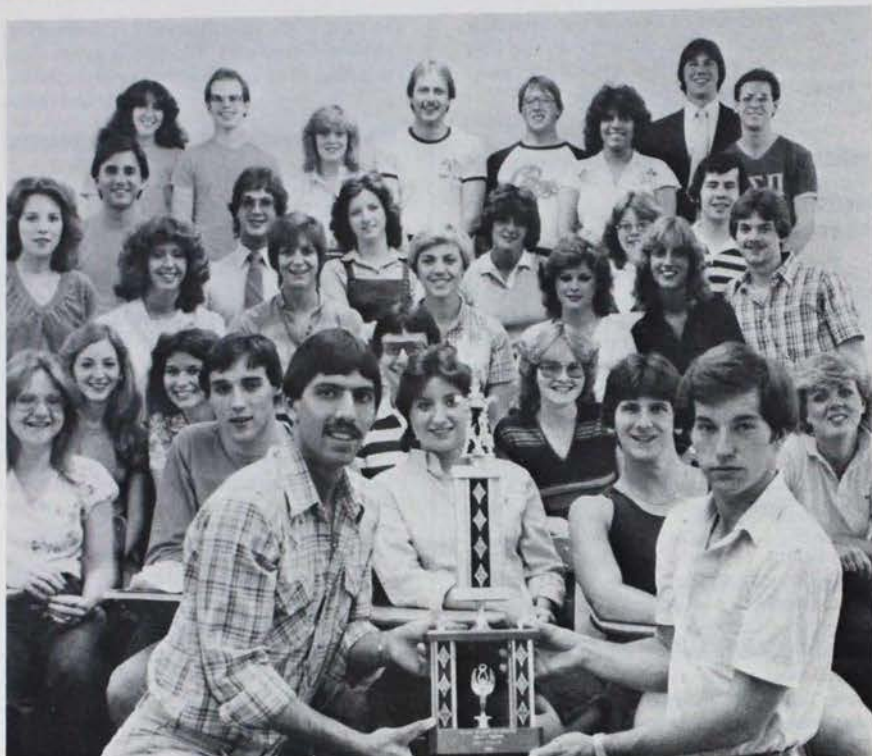
OHIO ALPHA OMICRON

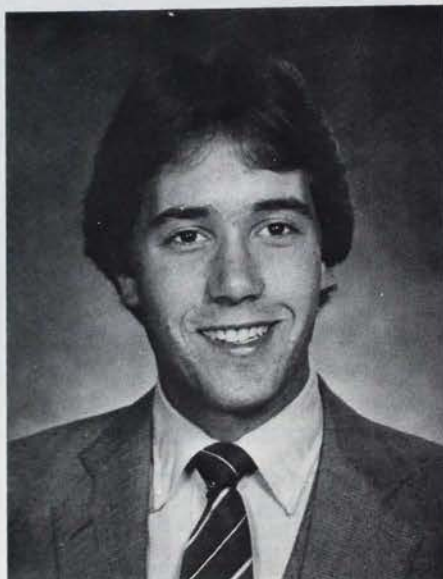

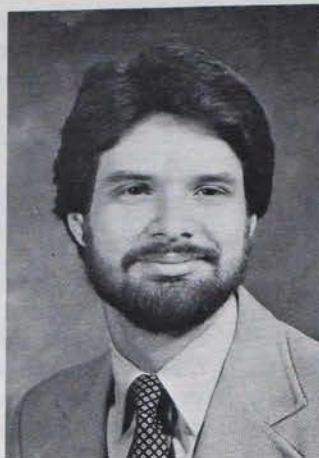

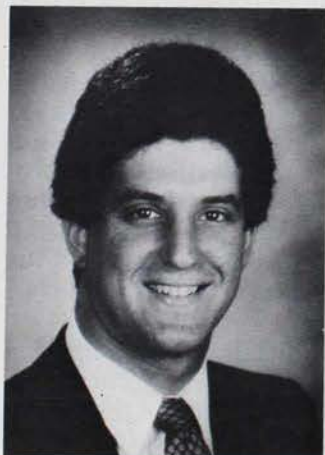
A charter member of Kappa Xi Chapter at the University of Southwestern Louisiana, **CHERYL A.**

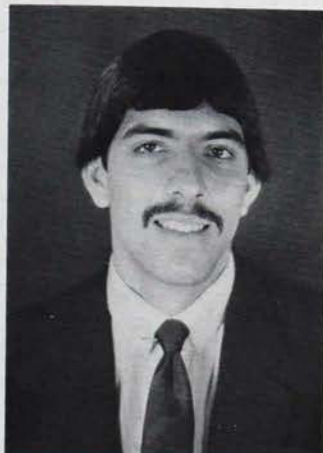

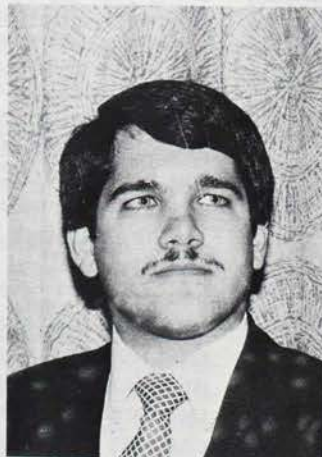

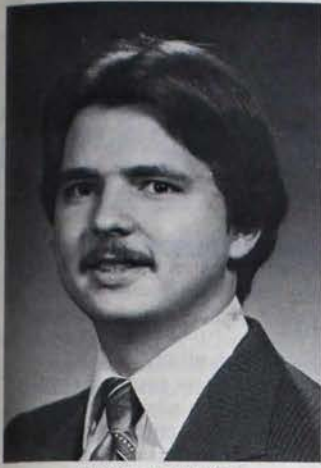

Aside from recruiting and pledging, we have several social and professional functions to keep the members and pledges interested and busy.

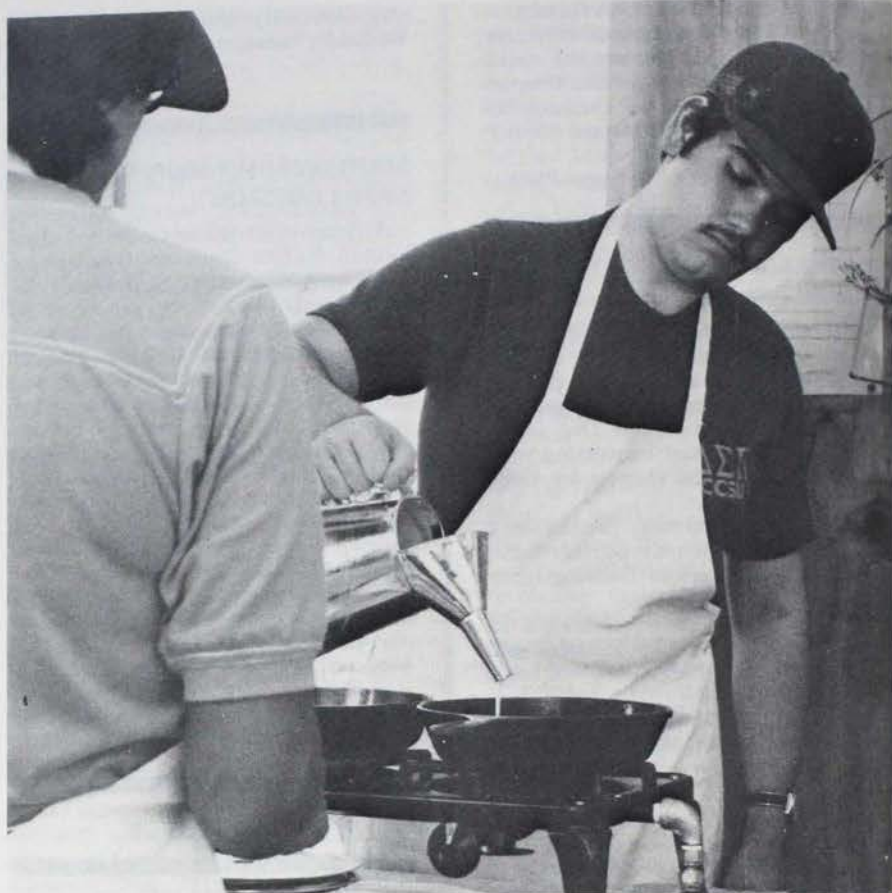

During the fall of 1982, news of the deaths of two Golden Council members was received.

On August 13, 1982, LaVerne A. Cox died while vacationing in the San Francisco area. Brother Cox was a 1954 initiate of Alpha Delta Chapter at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. He served Delta Sigma Pi as Midwestern Regional Director and, subsequent to a regional reorganization, North Central Regional Director from 1963 through 1973. Brother Cox also served as a member of the National Executive Committee from 1965 through 1969 and served on the Board of Directors of the National Association of Manufacturers. He had most

recently served the fraternity as advisor to Iota Chi Chapter at Illinois State.

Brother Monroe Landreth, a 1946 initiate of Alpha Lambda Chapter at North Carolina-Chapel Hill, succumbed to cancer at age 71 on October 17, 1982. Monroe served Delta Sigma Pi as a District Director and as Southeastern Regional Director from 1957 until 1973. He most recently served as a District Director of the South Central Region and served on several National Committees. Monroe is perhaps best remembered as our Grand Brother of the South who could always be seen at Grand Chapter Congresses with his Yellow Dog.

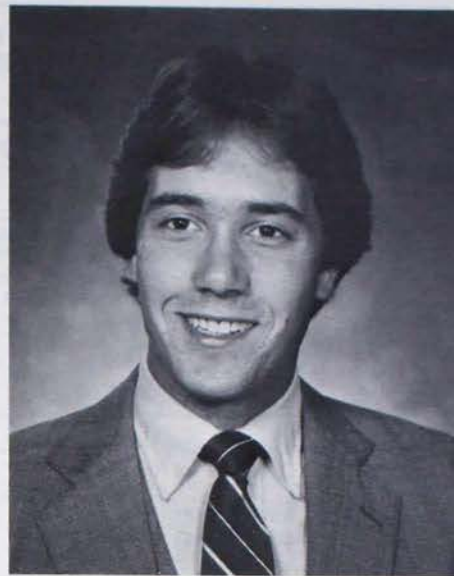

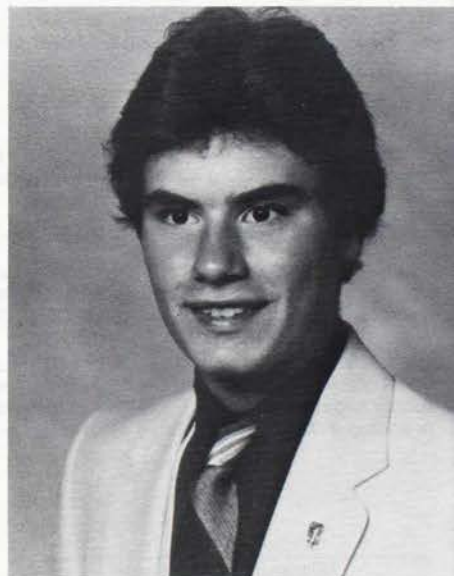
